Advocacy or Lobbying?

Advocacy

- Supporting a cause or issue
- Educating about your organization
- Conducting a training, briefing, or conference
- Hosting a tour or inviting a lawmaker to visit
- Attending a town hall, rally, or public meeting

Lobbying

- Asking a lawmaker to vote for or against a specific bill
- Sending a letter, email, or tweet asking a lawmaker to vote for or against a specific bill
- Taking a position on a specific bill
- Anything with a call to action

- When do I get in trouble?






Who are we advocating or lobbying?

- Texas House and Senate
- Texas Governor
- US Congress
- The White House

How a Bill Becomes a Law

- There are numerous ways **YOU** can make a difference during the process:
 - **Interim Visits**
 - During a Lobby Day
 - At Committee Hearing(s)
 - When Bill hits the Floor
 - **Contacting the Governor**

Who Makes an Effective Messenger?

You do...

- Tell your story
- Be brief and practice
- You're the expert
- It's OK not to know
- Follow up

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Who Makes an Effective **Messenger?**

Testimony

- Make eye contact Know your why
- Don't read
- Tell your story
- 2-3 minutes

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Office Visit

- Speak with staff
- Make the ask
- Leave Behind •
- Follow up

What's an Effective Message?

Explain the problem. Describe *why* is it important. Provide the solution. Ask for support.

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
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Power in Numbers

- Tell your story...and link it to others
- Make the connection to multiply your impact
- Organize, coordinate, and leverage your networks: peers, family, friends, neighbors
- Create the win, make the lawmaker the (s)hero of your story...
- Build the relationship and always follow through



Let's Practice

- House Bill 666 by Representative Lincoln Log will ban the sale of Legos in Texas.
- Senator Kill Joy and his legislative director Knoew Itall are meeting with constituents to learn more.
- The Senator hasn't taken a position on the bill yet.
 - Scenario 1 You are against the ban (Pro-Lego)
 - Scenario 2 You are for the bill. (Anti-Lego)

Remember: Meeting Goals

- Explain the problem.
- Tell your story...
- Why is this important?
- Share the solution...
- Make the ask!
